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




Methods

- 210 participants
- Multiple linear regression
- Relationship between internet use and wellbeing



Findings





Results

- No relationship between internet use and wellbeing in the context of homelessness
- Internet use related to age
- Wellbeing related to mental health and social support

Conclusions

- Breaking down the digital divide is not sufficient to anticipate changes in wellbeing
 - Need to understand confounding variables
 - Need to better refine our interventions
