Publishing Conventions in My Field

I am an interdisciplinary social scientist with training in fields as diverse as environmental studies, journalism, gender studies, global development studies, feminist economics, and urban studies. The peer-reviewed journals I publish in reflect this diversity. Some of my papers appear in journals such as *Feminist Economics*, *Climate and Development* and *World Development* that will only publish research with broad theoretical implications on a global level. Others appear in journals such as *Women's Studies International Forum*, *Natural Resources Forum* (a United Nations journal), *Water Policy* and *Development in Practice* that also value context-specific field studies with strong methodological and policy significance. I generally try to publish in journals that are read by academics as well as policymakers. Because my research findings are often used by governments, NGOs, think-tanks and other civil society organizations to inform policy formulation, advocacy, and public awareness raising, I also communicate research findings via op-eds, blog posts, conceptual animation, and public-facing

articles in venues such as *The Conversation*, *Policy Options*, *Modern Diplomacy* and the *Times Higher Education Supplement*.

I also publish professional research reports and peer-reviewed journal articles in collaboration with Canadian and intergovernmental environmental protection and international development organizations. Most of these reports are available publicly via open knowledge online repositories. Others (for example, policy briefs prepared for Global Affairs Canada) are available to Government of Canada employees via the Research and Knowledge Development Portal on GCPedia.

Earlier in my career (up to the Associate Professor stage), I mostly published alone. However, in the past 7-8 years I have also co-authored papers with current and former graduate and undergraduate students. Since it's very important for graduate students and early career researchers to establish publishing records, I often ask to be listed as a second, third or last author even when I have contributed significantly to a publication. I also provide funding and writing support to enable postdocs and graduate students (especially those with English as a second language) to publish sole-authored articles. As a result, many publications emerging from my research projects or from grants awarded to me do not appear on my CV at all.

The “half-life” of knowledge in my areas of specialization (gender and work, climate change, natural resources management, international relations, environmental policy) tend to be quite short. While monographs and edited volumes are also valued (especially if they are on foundational topics and concepts), peer-reviewed journal articles based on primary empirical research are generally considered an important metric of academic excellence. The visibility of one's research in policy domains (via professional reports, policy briefs, and service on advisory committees of state agencies, think-tanks and NGOs) is also considered an important indicator of professional excellence.
